


HCUK membership levels currently vary significantly by age and school

All UK Harvard grads




Years since graduation

All UK Harvard grads




School of graduation

HCUK's NPS also varies significantly across populations (1 of 2)








BY YEARS SINCE GRADUATION



HCUK's NPS also varies significantly across populations (2 of 2)




Lapsed members have left the club for a variety of reasons

- "Events too far away."


- "Both dues and events are very pricey for students."

EXAMPLE COMMENTARY

Events:

- Make some of the events more accessible to recent graduates (often still students!) by offering larger discounts on the full ticket price
- More events such as lectures should be free
- Please provide some free events or informal meet ups
- Events planned by HCUK are generally too expensive
- Events are too expensive, and don't provide good value
- Can you make the events much cheaper if you don't eat and drink at them also?
- Lot of activities are expensive. Not all into law, banking or consultancy.

Could we provide even greater transparency?


Membership fees:

- Can you have any membership joining proofions e.g. join for the first year for free; get six month free; etc?
- I do not feel it is value for money. I question where the membership fees go, having seen the annual finance reports and yet still being required to pay for events
- Personally can't afford the subscription
- Would be good if membership in HBS allowed membership in the Harvard Club. Ridiculous to pay twice!
- The £50 is too high for pensioners (such as me)

Current members: Feedback on past events has been very positive




"Well chosen subjects!"

"A great variety of events on different topics." "The event with Dean Martha Minnow was well attended and delightful. I am hoping to attend more events in the coming year."




Current members: The types of future events members would be interested in are quite diverse




Current members: The most requested timing for events is 7pm on Thursday, but a wide range



Current members: In terms of event locations, current members are primarily located in central London




Current members: Members expressed interest in the following additional activities

"Good, an admirable range of activities and opportunities."

"Quite good."

"Read it when I get it; I get the sense it is often for those recently graduated in their 20s/ or retirees and not much in between. Be great to get more of the in between!"

"I am quite unaware of its existence, and if I see it, the hearty emphasis on networking passes me by and the dominance of events in the City ditto."

"A new format to highlight events and use more images and web links would be helpful. Is there an HCUK website or blog?"

"I seem to get a lot more email from Harvard than just those you mention, e.g. HBS, and then there's some Harvard student sponsorship foundation or etc. Sometimes I just end up ignoring all of them, because they're not well enough differentiated, from/subject lines aren't clear enough about what it is and why I'm getting it, etc. Unfortunately that's not something that can be solved unless you all worked together, but not likely/easy."

Current members: Miscellaneous additional comments

- There could be greater interaction relationship between HCUK and **other Harvard clubs** such as the HBS Club of London, HKS London etc. At present HCUK is not an umbrella for all of these, but perhaps if it were there could be a greater sense of one university rather than different silos, with HCUK essentially being the Harvard College Alumni club.
- More culture, less commerce
- Would be helpful to have a **better website or blog** with more resources for UK members. Have tried to volunteer and suggest events in the past and had limited response. Who are the HCUK representatives and how do we get in touch with them? How do we suggest or host events?
- I miss the former **Radcliffe externship program**
- I find it a bit US orientated which is fine of course I am a big fan of the US and Harvard, but we are (sort of) in Europe and it would be nice to encourage **non-American Harvard alumni** to join up. When I go to events, it is all Americans in London meeting up, which is a bit off-putting. I appreciate that may be the make up of the membership in which case, it is more accurately Harvard Club for Americans in UK which is equally fine and maybe that is its real purpose.
- Why the collaboration with **How To Academy?** This is not something I am interested in but seems to have taken over the monthly mailings. It is a level of advertisement I am not comfortable with I feel like I am being spammed. I would be interested to know how and why the HCUK developed this relationship with the How To Academy (Which also happens to be a London-only company. Again, not serving the club of the UK promise).
- I oppose the HCUK branding; it is a **club of London**, regardless of if it provides application advice to all UK students. Being a paid member is only beneficial if you live in the Greater London area. I also do not think the club does enough to keep alumni connected to the wider university. Further, I feel that it does not do sufficient to engage with students from **state schools** and those in less affluent areas
- Very **US orientated**. Can you encourage UK graduates to get involved there are lots!
- Think HCUK is mainly for **recent arrivals** and short-term residents. I am a long-term resident.
- Would be happy to help with interviews, book awards, etc. just without paying member dues

Different demographics:

- I think that too many of the events are skewed towards affluent middle aged members.
- Majority of activities youth, financial and legally oriented, with the cultural activities tending to be "entry level". Some of us have other interests/expertise
- · Not sure whether the club suits the younger graduates

More events:

- Unless I am missing emails, there doesn't seem to be much going on
- Not really enough interesting events
- Not enough free/casual community-building events on offer in London. Too
 many paid "networking" events that feel very instrumental and are good
 for people looking for a job, professional contacts, etc. but not really for
 those just looking to connect with interesting people and forging new
 friendships
- I would rate it higher if the events were more relevant to the university and not social events that in effect could be arranged by another club
- Some of the events appeal, some don't. Many are scheduled at times my schedule won't permit me to attend
- · Could do with a few more events!
- Activities are not that interesting nor diverse, although it is still good to attend 1-2 events a year to remain connected
